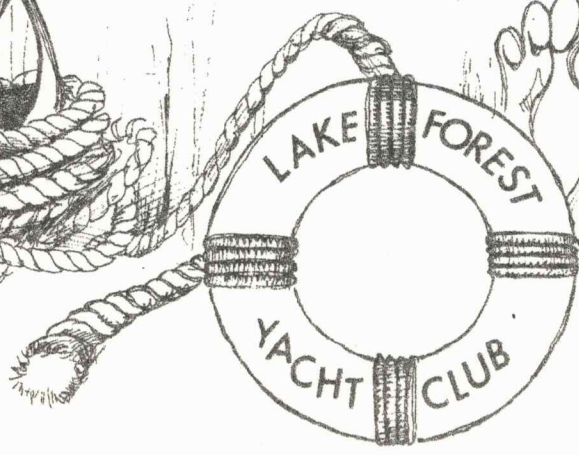
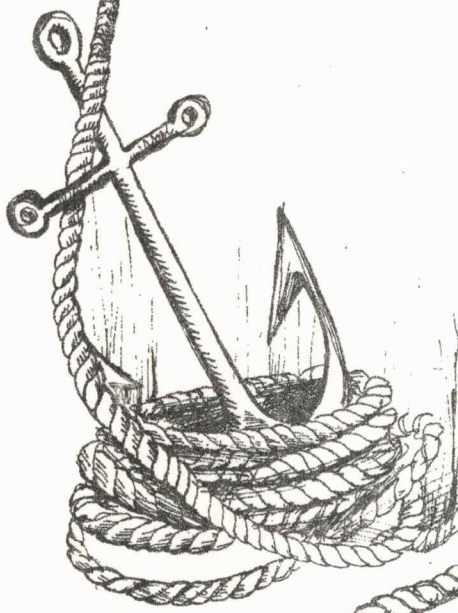

NEWS WATCH

695 housing units have been proposed for the Waterways section of Lake Forest. The Jefferson Township Planning Board received a Summary Environmental Impact Statement on Jan. 26 which included proposals to hook into the Weldon Mine Well for potable water and spray irrigation of approx. 160,275 gallons per day of sewage behind the Texaco station and Lake Shawnee. 52 single family dwellings on Venetian Drive and Emerald Isle are proposed. In his summary statement on the 159.4 acre tract the developer notes that

"the maximum number of units allowed under the Cluster Development option is 556. In an attempt to meet the spirit of the least cost housing, however, the developer is providing 'Manor' homes which is the least expensive unit that a private developer can provide and be economically feasible. Consequently, the total number of units allowed has been increased by 25% to a grand total of 695 as provided for under the Density Bonus provision of the Cluster Development option. It is noted that under this provision only 139 units would have to meet the criteria of 'affordable' housing while in fact, the developer is proposing a total of 323 'Manor' homes."

The developer maintains that the two or three bedroom townhouses and manor houses, in their experience, will be occupied by "young marrieds or singles or the empty nesters....and that a portion of the market place will be second home ownership" so therefore very few school age children would be added to the school system. The Planning Board will address this proposal at their next meeting, March 2, 8 P.M., Municipal Building.

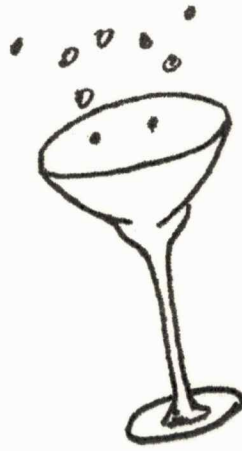
Township "Neighborhood Meeting" at Stanlick School, Feb. 2 was attended by local residents who questioned the towns road paving plans (nothing in Lake Forest), schedule for cessation of Lakes Shawnee and Hopatcong as sources of drinking water (summer 1982), a curfew to cut down on night time vandalism(?), and ordinances to inhibit dirt biking (?). The greatest part of the evening concerned residents questions on the Waterways development proposals. Questions included: traffic flow (the sole exit from the 695 unit development is onto Rt. 15 south next to the bank), water (get decent water to the residents and let the developer increase supply to the system with an additional ground-water source), sewage (one of the two main streams feeding Lake Shawnee runs through the center of the proposed spray irrigation area), increased school taxes (2-3 bedroom units usually indicate more than a 1-2 person occupancy), over-development (an attractive area will be destroyed by insensitivity to its beauty and its limitations).

\$1.5 million water utility improvement bond passed Jefferson Township Council on the first reading Feb. 3. These monies will be used for the construction of well and treatment plant and distribution lines to connect the Weldon Mine Well into the old Sparta Mtn. Water System. 2nd reading will be Feb. 17.

Dr. Ron Giberson has replaced Joseph Ennis as Superintendent of Jefferson Township Schools. Prior to accepting the position here he was Superintendent of Hanover Area School District in Wilkes-Barre, Pa. He resides in the Milton area of Jefferson.

William and Helen Hokenjos filed suit against the state, the DEP, and former governor Byrne. The Hokenjos suit says that they were never paid for the land taken from them when the state built a pipeline and pumping station on their property to draw water from Lake Hopatcong during the 1980-81 drought.

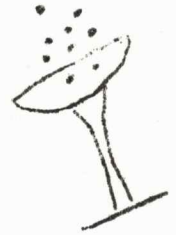
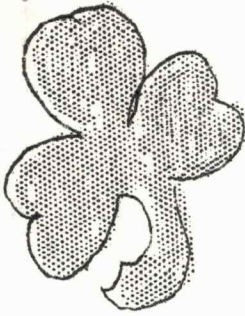
