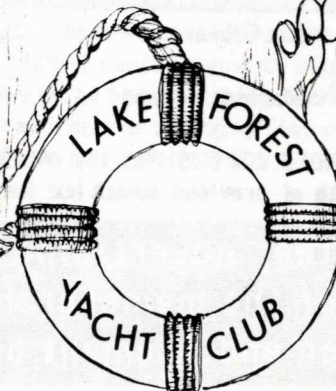

Commodore's Message

Dear Members,

Discussions at our November Trustees' Meeting were, as you might suspect, dominated by the subject of renewing the Regatta in 1987. The Regatta requires a lot of time, effort and money if it is to be successful. If you read the fact sheet that you got with your notice for the December 5th General meeting (it is repeated again in this issue of the PORTHOLE), you will see just how much Club money is involved. It's also fairly easy to see that a hefty profit can be made; or a substantial loss can be sustained. Aside from the profit/loss picture, I feel the two most important things for the membership to consider are: 1. liability insurance; and 2. a Lake Forest member to act as a coordinator. The insurance issue is by far the most crucial thing we face. The NJ Racing Assoc. suggested 2 million dollars worth of insurance, but the Trustees feel 5 million would be better. In any event we will hash this out on Dec. 5th. The other thing is a coordinator. We must have one person step forward who is willing to do all the legwork, and at the same time watch out for the Club's interests. If a member doesn't volunteer I feel it would be neither proper nor prudent to allow an outside, non-member to manage a Lake Forest sponsored event that has the potential to impact so strongly on the Club. In the past, the Regatta has generally been a good thing for us. It has pulled the community together. But we must weigh all things and decide if it's worth the risk. One bad accident, whether it's on the water, the beach or in a car on the way home (after drinking beer all day), and the Club would be in jeopardy. Think about it, and come to the General Meeting ready to discuss the pros and cons.

I've got some really positive things to comment on. The first is the Halloween Party at the Club. Everyone I've talked to thought this was the nicest thing the Club has ever done. That may be an overstatement, but I do hope the next Social Trustee will feel it was a good thing, and do it again. The other thing is the usage of the tennis court. Even as the days get shorter and colder, people are playing. The tennis court will be worth it all if it keeps one borderline family from quitting the Club.

I've saved the bad news for last. During the first week or so of November the Clubhouse was broken into, and our TV stolen. At first the police thought it was the work of local kids, but then a few burglaries occurred in the community. This led the police to suspect that professionals were at work. No matter who's doing this, I believe we should all start looking out for each other. If you are at home during the day take a few seconds once in a while, and make sure your neighbors' house is o.k. Let's start our own little "neighborhood watch". If you see something suspicious call the Jefferson Detective Bureau at 697-1300. I would suggest we discourage our kids from hanging out on Club grounds after dark. In addition to the burglary thing, there's also been some vandalism on the Clubhouse. If we or the police catch anyone damaging Club property we will sign a complaint and seek damages. Let's hope all of this gets resolved. See you at the December meeting.

A SYNOPSIS OF THE
LFYC TRUSTEES MEETING

November 4, 1986

Regatta

Peter Garland attended the meeting to give the Trustees his insight into the running of the Regatta so that an informed brief could be given to the members at the Annual Meeting. The net gains from 1974-1984 were presented. The negative as well as the positive points to consider are: insurance, traffic problems, security, income loss/gain, social benefit, sporting event. The fact that the Racing Association could get the race sanctioned but they do not have the funds to run the race. All financial responsibility would fall to LFYC. Phil Schiff will investigate the cost of obtaining adequate insurance. There is a need for someone to chair the committee and volunteers to work the race and also to obtain ads for the Ad Book, which Ed Ross has said he would also work on.

Nursery School

Diane Faruolo reported that Wayne Corneilus was to get back to her with an estimate of the cost of preparing and placing the new playground equipment. The Board gave approval for a cost not to exceed \$2600.00. Anything over that cost must be referred to the Board.

A Snack with Santa will be held. The Board gave approval for guests to attend. The Halloween party was a success.

Social

Volunteers are still needed to run the New Year's Eve Dance.

Carole Bradley has requested June 23, 1987 for the 8th grade dance.

Office

The computer is still being researched and the cost may exceed \$1500.

Multi-year

M. Yorkston reported that the Playground is set to go. A new plan is being drawn up for a 2 sided slope roof. Mike Leondi has an architect who will draw up the plans at a cost of \$1000.00, so that bids from contractors can be obtained. He will try to have the plans and bids for the Annual Meeting.

Samco will repair the toilet in the Club House men's room when he winterizes the galley and outside bathrooms.

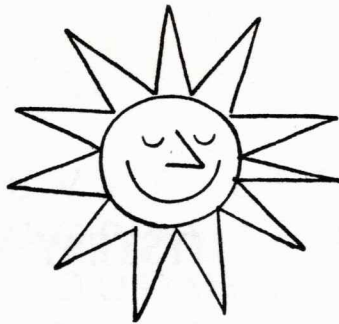

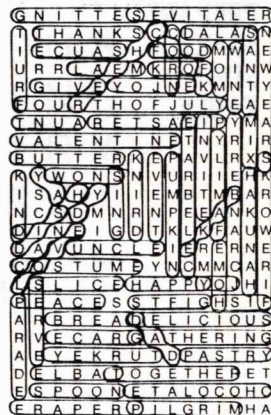

Favorite Casserole

- 2 packages, 10 oz., frozen broccoli spears
- 2 packages, 10 oz., frozen cauliflower flowerettes
- 1 lb. Velveeta
- 1 cup butter
- 1 tube Ritz crackers

Cook the broccoli and cauliflower according package directions. Drain. Cut into bite-size pieces, put in 9"x12" baking dish. In a saucepan, over medium heat, melt Velveeta and 3/4 cup butter, stirring constantly, until smooth and completely melted. Pour cheese mixture over the broccoli and cauliflower and mix well. In a ziplock bag crush the Ritz crackers. In a small saucepan melt remaining 1/4 cup butter, remove from heat, stir in crackers until well mixed. Sprinkle cracker mixture over top of broccoli and cauliflower mixture. Bake, uncovered, for 15-20 minutes at 350°F.

HOLIDAY JELLO MOLD


- 1. 6 oz. box cherry Jello
- 2 cups hot water
- 1 cup cranberry juice (cold)
- 1 cup cranberry sauce (whole berry)
- 1. 12oz. can fruit cocktail (drained)
- 1 cup walnuts

Dissolve Jello with hot water in 13"x9"x2" glass dish. Add cranberry juice, fruit cocktail and cranberry sauce. Stir in and distribute fruit evenly throughout Jello. Sprinkle walnuts over the top. Refrigerate overnight.

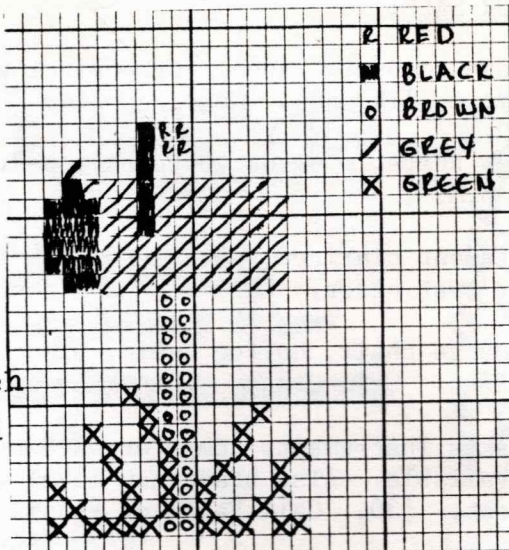

Counted cross stitch is easy to learn and addicting as you watch a colorful design developing on a plain piece of fabric.



This little project is fast to do, can be personalized with your name or address or it makes a nice exchange gift with a friend's address on it.

Use a 14 count Aida cloth using TWO strands of floss. Frame in a 2½ inch round frame. Work ½ cross stitch in one direction // then the other cross ~~XXXX~~ to complete the stitch.

CENTERING YOUR DESIGN . . . It is important where you make your first stitch, as it will place the finished design on your material. Find the center of your fabric by folding it in half, top to bottom and again right to left. Pinch along the folds and the center will be creased. Baste along these lines if necessary. Find the centerpoint of your graph either by the arrow marks if shown, or by counting the squares. Each square on the graph represents a square on the fabric. From the centerpoint, count up to the top row of the design . . . Then count left or right to the first symbol and begin at that point.

PLACE FABRIC IN HOOP . . . and gently pull until taut and tighten screw. The screw should be in the "ten-o'clock" position. This will keep your floss from becoming tangled in the screw with each stitch. (If you're left-handed, put the screw at "one-o'clock".)

NEVER KNOT YOUR THREAD . . . Hold an inch of thread behind the fabric and secure it by the first two or three stitches you make.

USE A STAB-STICK METHOD . . . to avoid pulling the fabric out of shape. The stab-stick is done in two motions — straight up, and then straight down — keeping the fabric taut. But do not pull the thread taut-snug-not tight. By using this method, the thread lies just where you want it — and it will not be pulled too tightly. When working your design, the same hole in the fabric will often be used for more than one cross.

TO FINISH ALL THREADS . . . run needle under four or more stitches on the back of your design and cut close. To begin a new thread, run needle under several stitches and catch end of thread.

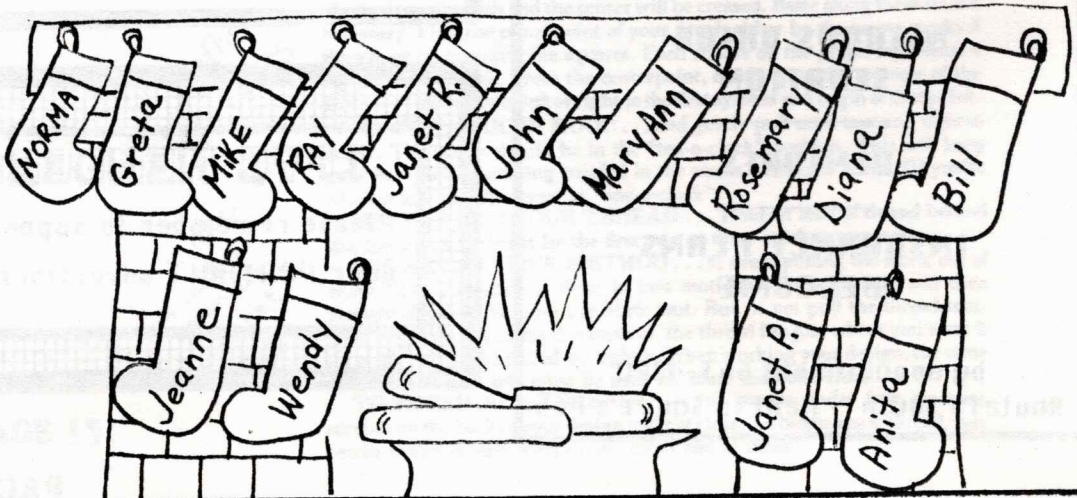

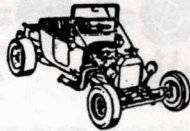
